## <u>Overture</u>

As we near the end of the school year I always like to take time to reflect on my favorite teachers who shaped me, mentored me, and really taught and modeled for me how to teach. The three best pieces of teaching advice I ever received are:

- 1. Live in their world: We are older than (most of) our students and have had very different life experiences. By taking an interest in *their* interests we can relate music and technique to knowledge they already have (I've used soccer, baseball, Minecraft, and food references more times than I can count). We also build trust, the desire for them to work hard for us, and build empathy. Understanding family dynamics and current situations are also important (last year I had a student whose parents were going through a divorce, which I didn't learn about until months into the proceedings, and of course his practicing was affected).
- 2. What we say and what they hear are two different things: This is related to #1, of course. As I wrote earlier this year, each of us is hard-wired with different motivations and learning styles, and it is incumbent on us as teachers to make sure we aren't spouting off with whatever we think is important without ensuring our students are actually understanding it.
- 3. You have to love them all! This should come as no surprise, but can be difficult when not every student practices as much as they should or likes the same pieces we do! This is especially difficult when we see the potential for students when they don't always see it themselves. It is a critical part of our job to see- and mirror back to them- the inherent worth and value of each of our students.

This is my final column as editor of the *Concento*. It has been a pleasure to serve alongside you all in the mission of our local chapter of MTNA.
