Happy Fall, Everyone!

I have been thinking about what to write for today, and the thought that keeps coming to me is both admiration and dismay at the different learning styles and abilities of my students.

If life is like an orchestra, with necessity for many different instruments (and support staff), our studios are surely a representation of a preparing symphony. An example in my rather small studio is one student preparing for level 10 RCM exams, and a 10 year old girl who has had lessons for 3 years (transfer to me) who hasn't mastered a C one octave scale. My preparation for my advanced student is to study her scores, on my own first, and then use harmonic and melodic analysis in her pieces to see patterns and the composer's intentions. Then we address technique and period style. This is so rewarding with this motivated student! My preparation for my student who struggles to name the notes on the piano, and to recognize them on the printed page is very different. We had to go back to the beginning and start with note reading, note values and note naming. This required approaching piano study from a whole new angle: instead of using the Faber/Piano Safari/Marlais method books I am most familiar with, I researched books that wouldn't embarrass her with their elementary nature, yet provide an extremely basic study. To my surprise and hers, too, she is making progress. Yesterday she played a D two octave scale with no mistakes! I neglected to say that the goals of my students' parents determine the approach I take as a teacher. I might easily have said this little student would do best without scales and arpeggios, and we should stick to easy note reading for enjoyment. But her parents want her to be a proficient pianist, as most of her cousins are, and this little girl expressed her desire for this accomplishment as well.

My little orchestra is tuning up!

There was discussion last meeting about using one piano and the same recording equipment for all students and giving each student two minutes to warm up before making their recording submission (one take only), then having a break to sterilize everything. I'm willing to dedicate Friday afternoon through Sunday to accomplish this.

WSMTA MTNA PERFORMANCE COMPETITION

Registration Deadline September 16, 2020 · Video Submissions Due November 2, 2020

The 2020 WSMTA-MTNA Performance Competition will be an online competition.

- The MTNA application Entry Deadline for the WSMTA-MTNA Competition is Wednesday, September 16, 2020, 12:00 noon Pacific time. Registration opens in August. Please see the MTNA website for registration and more information.
- A video submission page will be available on the WSMTA website on September 17 with instructions and guidelines.
- Video Submission Deadline is Monday, November 2, 2020, 11:59 pm Pacific Time.

Guidelines for the WSMTA-MTNA Performance and Outstanding Artist Video Competitions:

1. All recordings must be uploaded and submitted via YouTube links (privacy: unlisted). The WSMTA submission page will be available on the WSMTA website on September 17, 2020.

- 2. (Hopefully this will be modified for our chapter event) Videos can be made at home by the student, in the teacher's studio or in a performance hall. The quality of instrument, location, or quality of video will not be a factor in judging.
- 3. Make video recordings with one fixed camera angle/location, focused such that the performer and the accompanist (if applicable) are visible at all times. Pianists should have face, fingers and feet visible at all times. To ensure quality and consistency of the videos among entrants, set up the camera from the audience perspective, limit background noise, and make sure the performance space is well lit.
- 4. Videos must contain all repertoire listed on the original application. Entrants should NOT introduce themselves or announce the piece being recorded.
- 5. Each piece (including individual movements of a larger work) should be recorded and uploaded as a separate video file. No editing is allowed. Each file must be labeled with the title and composer. For individual movements of a larger work, label with the title, Roman number of movement and composer. Example: Sonata in F minor, Op. 2, No. I, I., Beethoven. Preludes and Fugues may be considered a single piece.
- 6. All entrants must perform by memory.
- 7. (not pertinent to our event, it discussed accompaniments)
- 8. Students and teachers should review videos before submitting to check sound quality and microphone placement.
- 9. DO NOT WAIT UNTIL THE LAST DAY TO SUBMIT VIDEOS. It takes a long time to upload the videos.
- 10. Upload videos one at a time, making sure each upload is complete prior to starting the next upload.
- 11. A high-speed internet connection is recommended.
- 12. Music will not need to be available for judges.
